



History of the Falcon and the Land in Question

- The Falcon Building was gentrified in the late 1990's
- According to the Black elders in our building, there was once a tenant-cultivated garden and farm
- In the following decade, newer tenants cultivated a garden that has existed to this day as a community green space, gathering space and garden.
- Safe space during the COVID pandemic
- In May, 2021 tenants offered to purchase the land and were ignored
- No residents were contacted about the sale of the land or the development until a notice was taped to our doors giving us 10 days to vacate the premises

History and story of the Falcon and land in question

- Preserve neighborhood as place welcoming to all economic backgrounds
- development threatens imminent displacement, Development won't demolish building, but will demolish garden
- talking with neighbors to understand story, garden has been long-standing community space, building housed people that worked in shipyards, grows things that cannot be grown anywhere else, 90-year-old Rose still lives here, yard is significant part of history for neighborhood
- Building gentrified in late 90s, direct displacement of black residents
- Building was in disrepair in late 90's, newer residents replanted garden in late 2010's
- Found out in April, owner consolidated property and sold to Homma, multi-national corp. in Japan
- Offered to purchase, no response from owner or management

Impacts of Development

- · Congestion/Noise of construction
 - Lack of parking: ADA accessibility issue
 - o Noise especially impactful to neurodivergent residents
- Environmental Impacts
 - "Urban heat islands"
 - Demolition of large trees that provide shade & homes
 - Natural light obstruction for residents
- Cultural/Social Impacts
 - o This land has been & continues to be cultivated as a food source
 - Poor & working class residents deprived of green community gathering space while wealthy white residents move in next door



Impacts of Development

- Congestion/ Noise of construction
- Environmental impacts
- Cultural/ Social impacts

Homma's Development Within the Scope of Portland's 2021 Anti-Displacement Action Plan

Portland City Council's Anti-Displacement Framework:

- 1) Empower community
- 2) Support inclusive economic opportunity
- 3) Support affordable housing and tenant protections
- 4) Advance environmental justice
- 5) Leverage private investment for public benefit
- 6) Analyze impacts, advance equity, mitigate harm

Homma's development does not align with Portland's 2021
Anti-Displacement Action Plan

- Development prioritizes private interests
- Supports wealthy residents

Possible Futures

- Community Land Trust that is mixed use and designated a safer rest area for unhoused people.
- Community garden organized by the Black and Indigenous community.
- Affordable housing that is spatially minded so as to facilitate collaborative cultivation on the land.

Next Steps

Homma/ Green Hammer:

 Halt development until community consensus is reached centering Black and Indigeneous voices.

Cully Association of Neighbors:

- Open/Ongoing Discussion: Advice and experience halting or influencing development
- Seeking to build solidarity with aligned organizations and neighbors

Want to start a conversation for a regenerative solution, a community solution

- Community land trust
- Community garden
- Affordable housing

We are not anti-housing

- No specifics offered around possibility of affordable units
- History of broken trust

Seeking to build solidarity with aligned organizations and neighbors

Albina one of most gentrified neighborhoods in the nation, how does this development tie to displacement?

Falcon is one of the last poor and working person buildings in the neighborhood, as this
and other development continues, already seeing direct displacement by rents
increasing exponentially, people have moved out because of garden space, low-income
people move out, rent goes up to \$1450 for 1-bedroom that is falling apart

Offered to purchase property, did you have a loan and money?

 Offered to match assessed value as shown in public records, ending up selling for double the value, was looking to access Metro grants, ended up selling for \$1.5m

What distinguishes your list from the standard NIMBY list of arguments?

- This is really about continued gentrification in neighborhood, see history of Albina
- NIMBY predicated on property ownership, legally property owners can do whatever they
 want, but it's not right, tenants don't own land, this is about culture not just the building
- Resisting economic and cultural impacts of poor people: housing, stores, outdoor spaces
- Humboldt Neighborhood Association reformed, Humboldt is Skidmore to Ainsworth, not Mississippi District, [Humboldt] described as underutilized, as more units sell, prices go up, advocating for tenants, development for profit is not development for community, intentionally done behind closed doors
